


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

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

The article is written by an editor Allison Wright for the Oxford Words Blog, which falls under the umbrella of Oxford University Press. Clicking on the links allows readers to find and explore other articles which are similar in nature to the article featured in the copy, and thus increase their knowledge on the issue. However, reading the category and tag links also provides readers with a basic understanding of what the article

will discuss. In this case, the category and tags inform the reader that the article will discuss, "word trends and new words," in the context of or with relation to "social media" and "Facebook", likely highlighting the resulting "changes in word meanings".


